







1st Century Corinth

Ancient Corinth

<u>Audience</u>

- Mostly Gentile
- Some Prominent Members:
 - Prisca & Aquila
 - Achaicus, Fortuatus & Stephanas
 - Crispus & Gaius
 - Phoebe
 - Erastus
- Most were of lower social standing and lesser means
- Small groups in various areas of Corinth;
 would come together on occasion



- Written in 54 CE from Ephesus
- At least the second letter to this church:
 - A previous letter is mentioned in 5:9
- Answers a letter seeking guidance on disputed matters
- Response to word of mouth reports about disorder and immorality in the community

Major Theme: Unity

- Divisions in Corinthian Church:
 - Allegiance to prominent leaders 1:12
 - Immorality 5:1, 2
 - Going to Law Before the Heathen 6:1-11
 - Marriage 7:1-40
 - Meats offered to Idols 8:1-13
 - Conduct of Women in the Church 11:1-16
 - The Lord's Table 11:17-34
 - Spiritual Gifts 12:1-14:40
 - The Resurrection 15:1-58



Unity Cont.

- Corinthians were:
 - Prideful
 - Spiritually arrogant
 - Thought they alone had the "truth"
- Paul said:

"Do not deceive yourselves. If you think that you are wise in this age, you should become fools so that you may become wise. For the wisdom of this world is foolishness with God." 3:18-19



God created diversity:



UMC Book of Discipline on Homosexuality

Article IV. Inclusiveness of the Church: The United Methodist Church acknowledges that all persons are of sacred worth. All persons without regard to race, color, national origin, status, or economic condition, shall be eligible to attend its worship services, participate in its programs, receive the sacraments, upon baptism be admitted as baptized members, and upon taking vows declaring the Christian faith, become professing members in any local church in the connection.

UMC Cont.

UMC Book of Discipline on Homosexuality

304.3: The practice of homosexuality is incompatible with Christian teaching. Therefore self-avowed practicing homosexuals are not to be certified as candidates, ordained as ministers, or appointed to serve in The United Methodist Church.

341.6: Ceremonies that celebrate homosexual unions shall not be conducted by our ministers and shall not be conducted in our churches.

UMC Cont.

UMC Book of Discipline on Homosexuality

613: The [conference council on finance and administration] shall have authority and responsibility to ensure that no annual conference board, agency, committee, commission, or council shall give United Methodist funds to any gay caucus or group, or otherwise use such funds to promote the acceptance of homosexuality or violate the expressed commitment of The UMC "not to reject or condemn lesbian and gay members and friends

UMC Cont.

- UMC Book of Discipline on Homosexuality
- Group of 80 UM Clergy call for amicable split:
 - They believe there are more divisions in addition to homosexuality such as inerrancy of the Bible
