**Overlooking an offense means:** Recognizing that Jesus died for the offense; forgiving; intentionally putting something behind you; allowing God to handle an offense; choosing not to dwell on an offense.



**Overlooking an offense does not** mean: Pretending that something didn't happen; stewing on a problem internally; saying you have forgiven when you are bitter inside; looking at the other person's future actions through the lens of a past offense. Peacemakers
