THE PARABLE OF THE SOWER

• Parallel Passages ■Matthew 13:1-23 ■Mk 4:1–20 Lk 8:4–15

13 That same day Jesus went out of the house and sat by the lake. ²Such large crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat in it, while all the people stood on the shore. ³Then he told them many things in parables, saying: "A farmer went out to sow his seed. ⁴As he was scattering the seed, some fell along the path, and the birds came and ate it up.

⁵Some fell on rocky places, where it did not have much soil. It sprang up quickly, because the soil was shallow. But when the sun came up, the plants were scorched, and they withered because they had no root. ⁷Other seed fell among thorns, which grew up and choked the plants. ⁸Still other seed fell on good soil, where it produced a crop -a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown. 9Whoever has ears, let them hear."

¹⁰The disciples came to him and asked, "Why do you speak to the people in parables?" ¹¹He replied, "The knowledge of the secrets of the kingdom of heaven has been given to you, but not to them. ¹²Those who have will be given more, and they will have an abundance. As for those who do not have, even what they have will be taken from them.

¹³This is why I speak to them in parables: "Though seeing, they do not see; though hearing, they do not hear or understand.

¹⁴In them is fulfilled the prophecy of Isaiah:
"You will be ever hearing but never understanding;

you will be ever seeing but never perceiving.

¹⁵For this people's heart has become calloused; they hardly hear with their ears, and they have closed their eyes. Otherwise they might see with their eyes, hear with their ears, understand with their hearts and turn, and I would heal them.'

¹⁶But blessed are your eyes because they see, and your ears because they hear. ¹⁷Truly I tell you, many prophets and righteous people longed to see what you see but did not see it, and to hear what you hear but did not hear it.

¹⁸"Listen then to what the parable of the sower means: ¹⁹When people hear the message about the kingdom and do not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what was sown in their hearts. This is the seed sown along the

path.

²⁰The seed falling on rocky ground refers to people who hear the word and at once receive it with joy.²¹But since they have no root, they last only a short time. When trouble or persecution comes because of the word, they quickly fall away.

²²The seed falling among the thorns refers to people who hear the word, but the worries of this life and the deceitfulness of wealth choke the word, making it unfruitful.




²³But the seed falling on good soil refers to people who hear the word and understand it. They produce a crop, yielding a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown."

- comparison between a known truth and an unknown truth


- fictitious story that presents content and situations that are true-to-life

The Path

- Hard-packed ground
 No penetration
- Birds eat seed
- people hear the message don't understand it
- the evil one comes and snatches away what was sown in their hearts.

The Four Soils ROCKY GROUND



Rocky Ground

• Thin layer of soil above rocks Sprouts early but fades Hear the word and receive it with joy. When trouble or persecution comes because of the word, they quickly fall away.

The Four Soils THORNS & WEEDS

Thorns & Weeds

- Seed planted in good soil
- Good seed not alone
- Weeds choke out
- People who hear the word
- Worries of this life, deceitfulness of wealth make it unfruitful




The Four Soils

Fertile Ground

- Good soil
- Seed produces bountiful harvest
- People who hear the word & understand
- Produce a crop, yielding a 100,
 60, or 30 times what was sown



WHY JESUS USED PARABLES

WHY JESUS USED PARABLES

- Jesus quotes Isaiah 6:9–10 to explain why He was using parables:
 - the hearts, ears, and eyes of the people had become dull, hard, and blind.
- He excited the curiosity of the concerned
- But He was also hiding the truth from the rebellious
- The parables did not keep people from learning the truth; rather, the parables excited their interest and encouraged them to learn.
