





Fruit in Western Painting

A apple, a peach, a golden pear, a juicy strawberry, an pomegranate ...

for painters of Byzantine, Gothic, Northern Renaissance and Italian Renaissance periods, fruit was part of a rich visual language.

Art-works exhibited in public, mostly in churches, were a stern proclamation that everyone could readily understand.

Throughout Western history these paintings with their symbolism, have been used as guides in illuminating the divine mysteries of the faith.
