- Was one genealogy of Joseph and one of Mary?

The Importance of Genealogies

- First, ancestry determined one's claim on land. (See Numbers 26.52-56)
- Second, ancestry determined claims to the right inheritance. (See Ruth 3-4)
- Third, ancestry in Israel established the basis of taxation.
 (See Luke 2)
- Fourth, any claim to the priesthood or royalty had to be verified by genealogy. (See Ezra 2.61-63)

Genealogical Comparisons

 Both genealogies are the same from Abraham until King David.

- Both genealogies show the royal blood line of Jesus.
- Both genealogies bear the names of Zerubbabel and Shealtiel after the lineage of David.
 - Two leaders of the Jews returning from the exile to Babylon.

The Genealogical Comparisons

Matthew's Account

 Traces the lineage forward.

- Begins at Abraham
- Divided into three sections of 14

Luke's Account

 Traces the lineage backward.

 Traces the lineage to Adam.

Includes many more people.

Women in the Genealogy

- Tamar, who was involved in a scandal with Judah (Genesis 38)
- Rahab, the Canaanite harlot of Jericho (Joshua 2)
- Ruth, who was not an Israelite, but a Moabite (Ruth 1:4)
- Bathsheba, the wife of Uriah (2 Samuel. 11:1-12:23)

What do the Genealogies mean?

- The Son of God had a troubled genealogical past.
- The genealogy of Matthew shows the divinity of Christ.
- The genealogy of Luke shows the humanity of Christ.
- No one ever questioned the fact that Jesus was a descendant of David.
